John Macnair Macdonald attended the school from 1942 to 1947; he is 74 years of age. He is a master coppersmith, brassfounder and metalworker. His scholastic achievements are of little consequence; however he not unexpectedly was awarded the prize in technical subjects in his final year. He enjoyed a considerable advantage over other boys as his father and grandfather had earned their living in this field since the eighteen sixties.

On leaving school he served an apprenticeship under his father, as did his father before him. In 1950 on the death of his father he inherited the family business and assumed the role of master. After 57 years he still retains an interest in the company. The company manufactures, to the latest quality assurance standards, components in a wide range of materials. Over the years it has produced pot stills, colandries, engine room pipework, supplied the nuclear, the oil and power industry, manufactured tracks for roller coasters, produced valves, tractor accessories etc., etc.

John celebrates his golden wedding at this time with his wife Isobel. They have two sons, Alasdair a chartered accountant and engineer and Iain, who once again served his apprenticeship under his father, together they manage the family business. Iain has three sons John, Richard and Alan. Shall history be repeated once again? Sadly both sons lost their wives in recent years, quite unexpectedly.

The President's interests include golf at Pollok and of course Ralston where he is senior past captain. He is member of the Incorporation of Hammermen of Paisley and also the Incorporation of Masons in Glasgow, and like our founder a burghess and freeman of the city.

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ALLAN GLEN'S ENDOWMENT SCHOLARSHIP TRUST

In 1995 the Honorary Secretary of Allan Glen's School Club was contacted by the secretary of the City of Glasgow Education Department informing him that while preparing to take over from Strathclyde Regional Council several sums of money had come to light which were remnants of Allan Glen's original endowment. Allan Glen had owned several properties in Glasgow and it is felt that they were probably the source. Apparently when the School closed in 1989 this money had remained in the hands of the Education Authority.

The question of what to do with these funds now arose and was the subject of discussion between our office bearers and the Education Department and during these discussions Glasgow Council was most cooperative and sympathetic. It was decided in the first instance to create the Allan Glen's Endowment Scholarship Trust. An appropriate deed was drawn up and the trust came into existence in 1998. The agreed composition was:- Club President, Club Secretary, two elected club members, the Director of Education, one member of his department as Council representative (currently Bill Brown as organising secretary), and a University representative (currently Professor Hendry) You will note that the Club has a working majority! There now followed many meetings to discuss the transfer of funds which ultimately required the approval of the Court of Session. We were very fortunate at this stage in the proceedings to have as our President, John Campbell who is a lawyer, and was able to provide a guiding hand at this most critical stage in the proceedings.

Approval was received and the new Trust had its first meeting in December 2001 at which it decided to award two scholarships, each of £1,000 per annum, to scholars of Glasgow schools who were about to start the study of engineering at a British university. It was felt that this use of the funds was very much in the spirit in which Allan Glen made his original bequest. The first two scholarships

were presented in the autumn of 2002 and a further two in Autumn 2003.

The engineering course at most universities lasts four years and so we can anticipate an eventual demand of at least £8,000 on the Trusts resources and, as they stand just now, this will use up all of the anticipated income. As a result of this conclusion the Allan Glen's School Club Committee, in spring of 2003, created a small working party to look into the question of fund raising. This group consisted of Jack McGuinness, Donald Lindsay, Sandy Howie and the Honorary Secretary, George Eastop. The group met monthly during the Summer and decided on an initial appeal to all former pupils for whom we had a contact address. Thereafter we would approach selected large engineering companies in the Central Belt and in this we received great help from Chairman of CBI (Scotland), Mr. Jack Perry and his staff who provided us with a list of likely firms.

Towards the end of 2003 we initiated the first phase. About a thousand letters were sent out and just over seventy replies have been received. The amount that has been raised is:- Cash Donations:- £4,360 Standing Orders:- £1,317 per year.

Recently we have contacted eleven companies and so far have had only two replies, both acknowledgements! We are very grateful to those who have supported us but are naturally rather disappointed that so far we have had so few responses.

I had, in September 2003, the privilege of attending a small reception in the City Chambers at which the two scholarships for the year were presented. It was quite moving to be there seeing these two keen young people, one of them a girl, with their proud parents, receive their awards. One felt that Allan Glen was still helping young people to achieve their ambitions, the way he helped so many of us.

* The Allan Glen's Endowment Scholarship Trust is now well established and has placed the name of Allan Glen once more at the forefront of education in Glasgow. A sincere thank you to all the Old Boys who have contributed so generously to the Trust.

* The Club membership is rising and our club is thriving but we need to attract more of, shall we say, the 50 somethings!

* A very active Club committee is working on your behalf. Many of you will have received a copy of Sandy Howie's excellent Directory of Members. This is but one example of what the committee does on your behalf.

* A thriving monthly lunch club which is unique among Glasgow schools.

* Above all the Club exists for the benefit of the Old Boys of Allan Glen's School and it is to that end that we need to direct our efforts.

This year witnesses one great change for the Club. After some 35 years as the Honorary Secretary, George Eastop has decided to retire. The Club owes an immense debt of gratitude to George who has in many respects been "Mr Allan Glen's" for these decades. Ian Dale now takes up the reins and we wish him well.

My abiding memory of two years as your President is the remarkable esprit de corps of the Allan Glen's Old Boys. Considering that our outstanding school closed some 30 years ago we maintain without doubt Glasgow's best and most active "Old Boys' Club", dedicated to the ideals of Allan Glen and the interests of the Old Boys. Long may it continue.

RALPH COWAN

The fact that Ralph reached his hundredth birthday on the 10th of January is outstanding in itself, but any discussion with him, on any topic, shows that age has not affected his mental faculties in any way. His memories, opinions and advice ensure that the conversation will be lively and clearly expressed.

He and his wife, Nita, came to Uplawmoor in 1957, when 'Dunira' was built in Tannoch Road and its garden studio erected later. This was a time of great contentment for them. Their limited edition of 'Sunlight & Shadow' in 1978 showed Nita's skill in 'Haiku' each page carrying Ralph's abstract illustrations.

His first venture took place when, in 1925, in his early 20s, he rented a workplace in Glasgow's West Princes Street; his working capital - £24. This was a boom time in estate house building and the little business thrived in the supply of leaded windows for several major contractors. For the British Empire Exhibition in 1938, a commission awarded to design a 46 ft high window depicting St Andrew for the Scottish South Pavilion brought the name Cowan to prominence in artistic circles and more work poured in until the war intervened.

Cunard's Queen Elizabeth was launched in 1938. Few would know that when fire destroyed her in Hong Kong harbour in 1972, the huge glass panels representing the four seasons at the Tourist Lounge entrance were Ralph's work. His determination to play a part in the liner's interior decoration is a story in itself, but space does not permit its telling here.

The war found Ralph in the R.A.F., a Radio Operator posted to radar stations at Peterhead and Islay. using his skills by creating images for use in training sessions to young men under his charge.

Returning to civvy street, teaching was his choice and he applied for a place in the Glasgow School of Art. By then holding a Diploma in Art & Design, he went to Jordanhill. From 1949, 23 years passed as Art teacher at Allan Glen's School, the happiest in his life, retiring at 68 when it was discovered that he was three years over the limit! In 1985, fundraising was needed to re-roof the church. £25 per member was suggested. Ralph held an exhibition in the Mure Hall and gave over £600, although he is not a member - he and Nita attended Quaker meetings while living in Glasgow. His wife, sadly, died in 1983. The Centenary Memorial glasswork was created by Ralph. A similar piece is in the Royal Faculty of Advocates building in Glasgow.

This article bears but a fraction of his activities the last exhibition was in the Royal Academy of Music in 2000.

A toast, adapted from the old Scots one, was proposed at his birthday gathering: "Here's tae him. Wha's like him!"

Ralph's 100th Birthday Lunch

Members of the committee enjoyed Ralph's company at a lunch to celebrate his 100th birthday. He was in good spirits and talked with enthusiasm about his many years at the school and remembered many of the pupils and teachers. We were pleased to present him a bottle of the Anniversary whisky and a tie.

On 10 September 2001 Ralph had this poem published in the Herald:

As Time Goes By

I phone the Health Service.
Identity established,
She says "Your date of birth please."
I say, "Oh!
You won't tell anyone will you?"
Sincerity in her voice
She says, "No."
I tell her ... an interval of laughter,
And I say, "I have been in this world a long time."
"You have indeed"
"Don't write me off.
Recently I did work, a sculpture for an
August Body to commemorate their having been granted
A Royal Charter.
It was a bi-centenary.
I am not as old as that!"

PETER B BELL

Many former pupils will remember Peter Bell, who taught science for a number of years in the 1950s and 1960s and who died on 23 March at the age of 70.

He was a jet pilot with the RAF, a competitor, administrator and historian of cycle speedway and an avid collector of science fiction literature.
